The buddies are high school students who apply to be a part of it. A typical camp experience. The helpers come away learning a lot about themselves! College students apply to be counselors.

 Sign-Up Form Lift Every Voice Newsletter (monthly, includes resources!)
- <u>EYLA</u>: Episcopal Youth Leadership Academy, Diocese of Oklahoma
 1-year program for 6th 9th grade, they apply, they must get a mentor, meet 6x per year (throughout the diocese), get leadership training prior to Camp: budget, finance, time management, taught how to plan a project, "nice meal" etiquette, bullying, reconciliation.
 Sabrina Evans
- Youth Networks in the Diocese of West Missouri: a youth minister for a geographical network of churches who each can't afford their own youth minister, provides a weekly youth group for anyone in the area.
- Unplanned Retreat, 6-12 graders
 Meet the kids where they are instead of assuming we knew what they needed.
 Friday night: 25 pieces of paper listing anything/everything available ... put your name next to whatever you want to do.
 The kids wanted to play and rest.

LGBT Inclusion

Andrea Foote, Diocese of California:

- Task Force working on a trans* inclusion policy for youth.
- Goal of adding an addendum to our Safe Church policy. "Called to Right Relationship"
- Part 1: making our spaces more gender neutral (labeling cabins by number instead of gender), dividing by "waffles vs. pancakes" instead of boys & girls.
- Brothers & Sisters in Christ vs. Children of God -- pay attention to what is gender specific
- Having frank conversations with kids that are welcoming and open: workshop times at camp (facilitated by adults)
- At camp, asked youth to identify their preferred gender pronoun on their nametag (her, him, they, etc.)
- Gender-safe sleeping spaces: if you identify as male sleep on the left, identify as female sleep on the right, and neither sleep in the middle
- Have it be a safe space where youth can "try-on" using other pronouns, etc.

Eric Travis, Diocese of Michigan

- EYE 2011: put transgender student person in a single room in the dorm with their sex (would want to do the opposite today...put them in a dorm room with the gender they identify as)
- My preference is to put people in the space where they identify. Have people always change clothes in the bathroom (not in cabins)
- "CIS Gender" = identify with the gender they were assigned at birth "Trans Gender" = do not identify with the gender they were assigned at birth
- Remove all "binary" gender (not just give them M/F options on forms)
- Ask them "where would you feel comfortable sleeping?"
- Treat them the same way we would treat a student with food allergies
- Get rid of the idea of "purpling" and euphemisms .. just say, "no sexual activity" or no unwelcome physical touch
- As open as the adults/leaders can be to say "this is a safe space" to talk about these issues, questions, etc.
- I can be a voice for change, include people to teach me and train me and make me more sensitive
- We try to have everyone sleep in the same room...make allowances for people with concerns

Joshawa Trader, Diocese of West Missouri

- experiencing more and more trans* students or gender neutral students
- we're all going to sleep in one big room together as a community

Randall Curtis, Diocese of Arkansas

• Have private bathrooms in the infirmary and a couple cabins. Offer those up for people "who feel uncomfortable" using the shared bath house.

James Lawrence, Diocese of Central Gulf Coast

- Had 2 students in the girls cabins identify themselves as male on the first night in the cabin during introductions. Campers were incredibly welcoming, open, affirming, and inclusive ... parents had a harder time when they heard about it.
- Asked students what they needed to be comfortable? (They wanted to go by male names and male pronouns that they preferred.)

 Asked parent who complained, "Everyone is welcome at our camp, what would you suggest we do instead?"

Carol Bianchini, Diocese of Northern Indiana

• Our policy requires us to have a shepherd at night to watch over all the kids and that everyone stays where they are supposed to be.

Questions:

- What do you do in a more conservative environment? do you get push-back from students? parents?
- How can we share our voice and respect other people's voices at the same time?
- What about camp cabins or hotel rooms?
 - Tell the group: "What if we had a trans* person come visit us for the week?
 Where should they stay?"
- Don't WAIT to make a policy until someone comes forward. No one wants to be the
 person you made a policy for. Most trans* students are self-conscience enough, we
 need to start training our communities before-hand. Plus, if we wait until someone
 comes forward, we'll be scrambling and making bad decisions.
- How do we help the churches provide safe spaces?
- We have to be leaders on this...we're not experts, but if not us, who?

Technology for Ministry

- Forma Directory > Advanced Search > State/Diocese who do Youth Formation (or any type of formation)
- http://zoom.us (video conferences) \$99/year, no user id/account required for invitees, meetings are recordable in MP4 file downloaded to your computer (free for meetings 40 minutes or less)
- Remind (text messaging / group message program ... for sending announcements)
 - Can add a "badge" to your message to allow them to respond with a simple answer Yes, No, Maybe
 - Web site interface and phone app
 - o Can schedule messages for weeks/months in advance

- GroupMe (text messaging / group messaging program), app.groupme.com
 - App is not required, they can just receive text messages if they don't have a smart phone
 - Web site interface and an app on your phone (both iPhone & Android)
 - o People you add to the group have to respond to "opt-in" to be a part of the group
 - Communicate with your Diocesan Youth Council or your Camp Staff
- Formstack/Wufoo (online forms and payment)
 - Automatic confirmation e-mails to parents or different subsets of registrations
 - Automatic notifications to parish youth ministers or rectors
 - ONE form with different options for students, adults, staff, etc.
 - Control what they input by having drop-down menus for parish-name
- Canva (easy, free graphic design)
- PosterMyWall.com (easy to design a poster in various sizes, \$7 per poster to download for high res quality, can download free with small watermark in corner)
- inbox.google.com -- also an app for your phone ... let's you mute certain e-mails until you're back in the office
- CustomInk.com -- have your youth design t-shirts online and send the design to you.
 Easy delegation and ordering! (no tax, no shipping, no artist fee) Must give them 2 weeks notice for free shipping
- Trello -- collaborative work online, boards to organize different topics, teams of people can contribute to the different boards www.trello.com
- MinHubApp (phone/tablet app, attendance database for reporting and trends, with photos, great for learning student names) http://minhubapp.com (one time purchase fee, currently IOS only)
- Evernote -- great for keeping to-do lists for various events (I use it to keep track of what I do every month, since I work independently, it's a good way to have a record that I'm actually working!) It has a companion app called "Scannable" which can be used to scan receipts and save them to your Evernote account to make turning in those expense reports much easier!

Brings action-oriented theologians and thought leaders together to provide better understanding, inspiration, and ideas you can use in your community to make a positive impact.

The conference is also broadcast via the internet to a network of Partner Sites (you can find partner sites on their web site or sign-up to be one)

- Focus on local social justice issues
 - Don't pretend like the church is outside of all this ... work on the stuff that is racial
 or gender inequality, bring people in to talk about issues
 - Divide into groups based on "What is one issue that you feel passionate about?"
 Have them come up with plans that they can do as young people.
 - Invite the local chief of police to come talk at a youth event!
- The Social Justice Network of the Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Michigan
 - Facebook group with conversations and information about things that are happening
- Salt Lake City was too white, too racist of a place for our General Convention. It was
 traumatic for people of color to attend and spend time there. We expect too much if we
 ask people of color to constantly have to stand-up and point out the injustices. White
 people need to help and stand-up, too (some are).
 - Young people were turned away from the Exhibit Hall
 - Young people of color / non-white ethnicity were asked much more to see their name badges
